Our Policy Work

Cybercrime & Cybersecurity

In 2022, we engaged in the final stages of the negotiations of the e-evidence Regulation, calling for well-functioning cross-border cooperation between law enforcement authorities and service providers. We focused on ensuring the security and confidentiality of data transmitted between service providers and law enforcement authorities, which resulted in the development of a new EU wide digital exchange platform. We also focused on the NIS 2 Directive, working towards a framework that enhances digital security in the EU without creating burdensome requirements for ISPs. In 2023, we will focus on the smooth implementation of these files and will continue contributing to other initiatives such as the Cyber Resilience Act, whilst keeping a close eye on developments in data retention and encryption.

Safer Internet

In 2022, we provided input to the European Commission on the Revision of the CSA Directive 2011/93/EU, moving the discussions away from a polarised debate and focusing on the technical implications. In 2023, we will closely monitor the developments of the directive in 2023, as well as the Better Internet for Kids Strategy.

Intermediary Liability

In 2022, we focused on the DSA and the Recommendation on piracy of live content. We hosted events and reacted to the DSA plenary vote, and engaged with the European Commission on piracy of live content. In 2023 we will take part in further meetings and in a stakeholder hearing with the European Commission and rightsholders, as one of the few ISP representatives active on the issue. We will also monitor the implementation of the DSA as well as the upcoming delegated acts.

Innovation & Growth

In 2022, we monitored the developments of the European online content legislative framework, including the national implementation of the EU Copyright Directive. In 2023, we will continue engaging on copyright issues. We plan to share our expertise on areas including audio-visual and video on demand (VoD), levies and rights management, geo-blocking and content portability, among others, with the aim of supporting the development of an ethical and cross-border online content market in the EU.

Data Protection

In 2022, we engaged with policymakers on the proposal for an ePrivacy Regulation and followed the EU-US efforts to transition from the Privacy Shield framework, crucial topics for SMEs. In 2023, we will continue to advocate for a robust legal framework that ensures trust and innovation while safeguarding our network users' privacy and data protection. We will continue to work towards a new transatlantic agreement. We will support negotiators in establishing a consistent, workable ePrivacy framework, whilst keeping an eye on developments in the enforcement of GDPR, encouraging further harmonisation, and on never-ending flow of data protection rules.

Market & Services

In 2022, we focused on accessibility requirements while following the discussions on the DMA. We also discussed the consequences for our sector of Russia's aggression against Ukraine, debating potential infrastructure disruptions and technical aspects concerning the EU-wide broadcasting prohibitions. In 2023, we will focus on the European Commission's Connectivity package.
